### 2016 Bass Tournament Summary

Mississippi's bass tournament anglers had another good year in 2016 based on 202 tournament reports. Average statistics for all lakes in 2016 were similar to those in 2014 and 2015. The average weight of bass and total numbers of bass caught were higher in 2016 than in 2014 or 2015. In 2016, average lunker weight was higher than the 2014 value, but lower than the 2015 value. At least five reports are needed from a lake to be included in the final "Lake Rankings." In addition, the five reports must include all of the information for each ranking metric. Eight lakes were included in the lake rankings. Once again in 2016, anglers were excited about the quality of the fishing at Ross Barnett Reservoir, and Pickwick Lake is still producing heavy winning bass stringers during tournaments. The coastal rivers continued to provide the best numbers of bass per day in 2016. The following summarizes the most important points from the 2016 Tournament Report:

- 202 reports were submitted from 26 different lakes
- In 2016, Pickwick Lake finished as the top lake in overall quality indicator rankings followed by Okatibbee, Ross Barnett, and Bay Springs.

Statewide Tournament Statistics

The largest bass was 11.34 pounds from Ross Barnett Reservoir.





A total of 202 tournaments reported 8,671 anglers that weighed-in 15,925 bass (Table 1). The number of tournament reports decreased in 2016 from 2015 (Figure 1). The most reports came from Pickwick.




- It took an average of 14.55 pounds to win a tournament in 2016 (Table 1). Of lakes with at least five tournaments reported, Pickwick, Bay Springs, and Ross Barnett had the highest average winning weights.
- Average weight of bass ranged from 1.28 pounds at Jourdan River to 3.40 pounds at Eagle Lake (Table 1). The statewide average weight was 2.23 pounds. Using average length of tournaments to define an angler day, the number of bass caught per angler day was highest on the Jourdan River and the pounds caught per angler day was highest at Lake Ferguson.
- The seasonal distribution of 2016 tournaments appears in Figure 2. March through July were
  the most popular months to conduct tournaments with at least 20 per month reported.
  Tournament reports were submitted from all 12 months.

• Average weight of bass weighed-in (2.23) in 2016 was higher than in 2014 and 2015. Pounds per day (3.99) in 2016 was similar to the 2014 and 2015 values. The hours to weigh-in a five pound bass increased from 338 in 2015 to 360 in 2016 (Figure 3).



Once again in 2016, five of the top 10 heaviest 5-bass limits came from Pickwick Lake (Table 2). Ross Barnett Reservoir had the second heaviest stringer while Bogue Homa had a top ten heaviest stringer in 2016. The largest sack was weighed-in at Pickwick by PWBT during December. First place for PWBT on December 31 weighed an impressive 32.44 lbs. Four of the 10 big sacks were weighed-in during March and three of the big sacks were weighed in December.

- The number of bass weighed-in at least five pounds slightly decreased from 219 in 2015 to 205 in 2016. On average, it took 360 angler hours to weigh-in a bass equal to or over five pounds. There were 205 bass that weighed a minimum of five pounds. This was 1.3% of the total number weighed in 2016.
- In 2016 there were 33 lunkers that weighed at least seven pounds. There was one lunker that weighed over 11 lbs. and two lunkers weighed were over 10 pounds (Table 3). The largest lunker was caught at Ross Barnett Reservoir on March 12 and weighed 11.34 pounds. The second largest lunker was caught on Pickwick on December 3 weighing in at 10.36 lbs. and the third largest lunker weighed in at 10.22 lbs. also on Pickwick. Pickwick accounted for 45% of the big bass and 18% were caught at Ross Barnett Reservoir. Bogue Homa supplied 9% of the big bass.
- Twenty-six clubs or tournament organizations submitted 202 reports (Table 4).
   Sixteen clubs submitted five or more reports and 8 clubs submitted 10 or more. The average number of reports received per club or organization was eight.

- Team tournaments were more popular than individual tournaments with 62% of the reports submitted from team events. These tournaments averaged 21 teams per tournament. Individual tournaments accounted for 38% of the reports and averaged 45 participants per event. Limits of bass were weighed-in by 34% of all anglers or teams during 2016.
- Lakes with at least five tournament reports were ranked by averaging seven "quality indicators" (Table 5). The top five lakes in order in 2016 were Pickwick, Okatibbee, Ross Barnett, Bay Springs and Bogue Homa. Pickwick Lake received high marks for winning weight and pounds of bass weighed-in per day. Lake Bogue Homa received high marks for average weight of individual bass weighed-in and hours to catch a bass equal to or over five pounds. The highest rank for average lunker belonged to Ross Barnett Reservoir. The Pascagoula River received high ranks for the number weighed-in per day, and Okatibbee Reservoir had the highest percentage of anglers weighing in a 5-fish bag. Natural fluctuations in bass abundance and size structure are normal, plus environmental conditions and angling pressure vary from year to year.
- Tournament bag limits varied from three to five bass and were more restrictive than state regulations. Most tournaments had a 12-inch minimum length limit.
- Success of this program depends on participation from clubs and tournament organizers. We thank all those who voluntarily submitted report cards. Higher numbers of reports allow better estimates of fishing conditions; not just a good or bad day's fishing by one or two clubs. Results can be used by tournament directors, anglers and biologists to better manage and enjoy our fisheries resources. Angler involvement has been and remains the key to protecting and managing Mississippi's fisheries resources.
