General Information: Lake Prentiss Walker is an 81 acre state fishing lake that was constructed in 1962 and was originally named Lake Ross Barnett. The Lake was closed for repairs in 1994 and reopened in 1997. Prentiss Walker is known for very large Bluegill and Redear sunfish.

Location: Off of Highway 35 in Smith County near the town of Mize.

Fishery Management: black bass, crappie, bream, and catfish.

Amenities

- 1 boat ramp
- 3 fishing piers
- 2 cabins
- 21 campsites with electrical/water hookup
- 3 picnic pavilions

Creel Limits

- 30 crappie per day with no length restrictions.
- 10 Largemouth Bass per day with no length restrictions.
- 100 bream per day.
- 10 catfish per day

Regulations

- Pole or rod and reel fishing only. No trot lines, limb lines, set hooks, jugs or yo-yo's are allowed.
- Carp, gar, buffalo, Freshwater Drum, shad, and Bowfin may be taken by use of Bow and Arrow, Crossbow, Spear or Gig.

Permits

- Sport fishing licenses and fishing permits are required except on designated days during National Fishing and Boating Week.
- Camping is on a first-come first-serve basis. Daily and monthly permits are available.
- Cabins rented by reservation only.

Sportfishing Tips

Crappie

- In the spring, target shoreline areas with jigs or minnows, especially around brush piles in shallow water. In the summer and winter, troll through deeper, open water areas.

Largemouth Bass

- Target coves containing submerged structure with spinner baits or plastic worms. Deep water points or creek channels will produce fish later in the year.

Bream

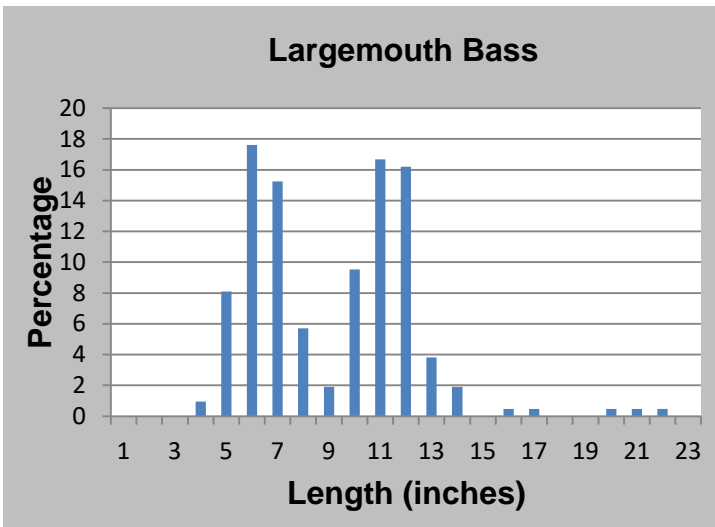
- Use crickets or red worms in shallow water especially from early summer through the fall.

Catfish

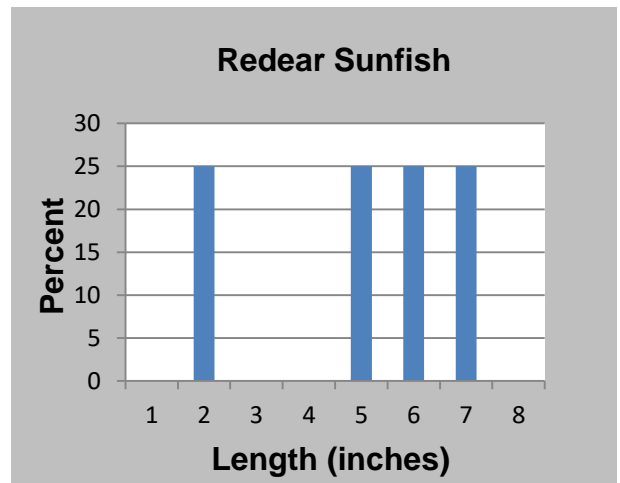
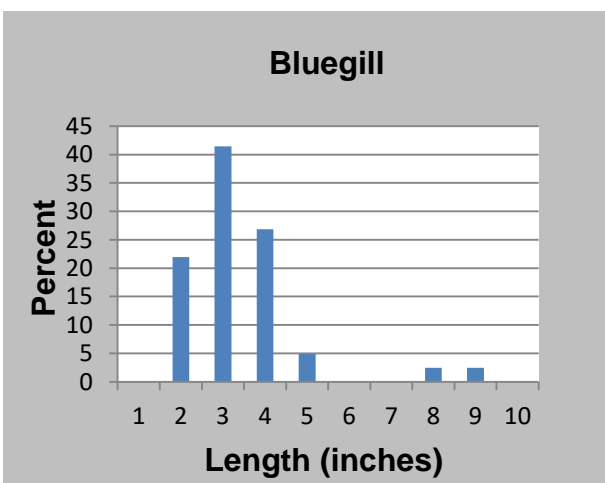
- Tight line on the bottom with live worms or stink baits.

Below: Lake Prentiss Walker record fish. Record fish must be weighed and verified by the lake manager, lake supervisor, or fisheries biologist. Anglers who catch a lake record fish will receive a certificate acknowledging their catch. There is no minimum weight for any open lake record.

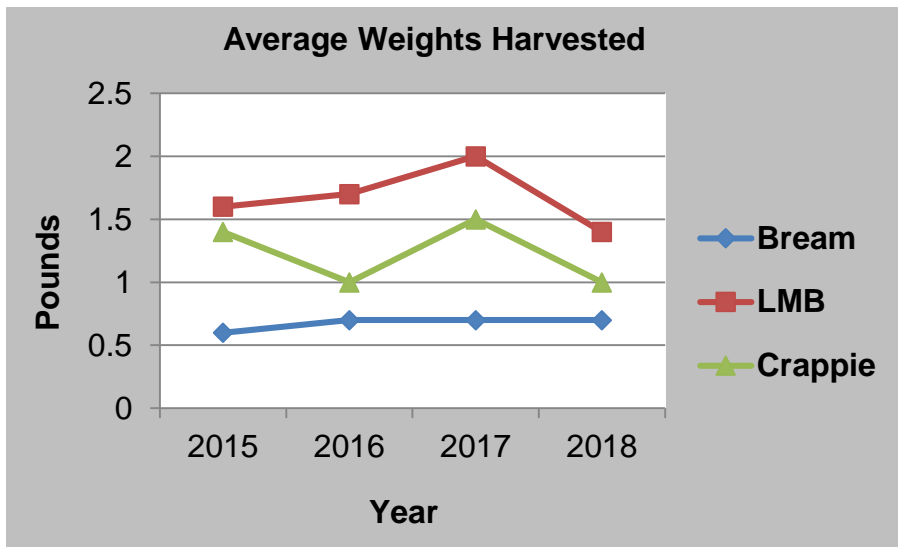


Left and Below: Length distributions for sport fish from the 2018 electrofishing survey. Largemouth Bass are numerous but small in size. The majority are less than 12 inches. There are some big bass present, but the lake is well known for its bream population. Prentiss Walker has a large amount of forage to produce trophy bream as evident from the sizes of the lake record Bluegill and Redear Sunfish.



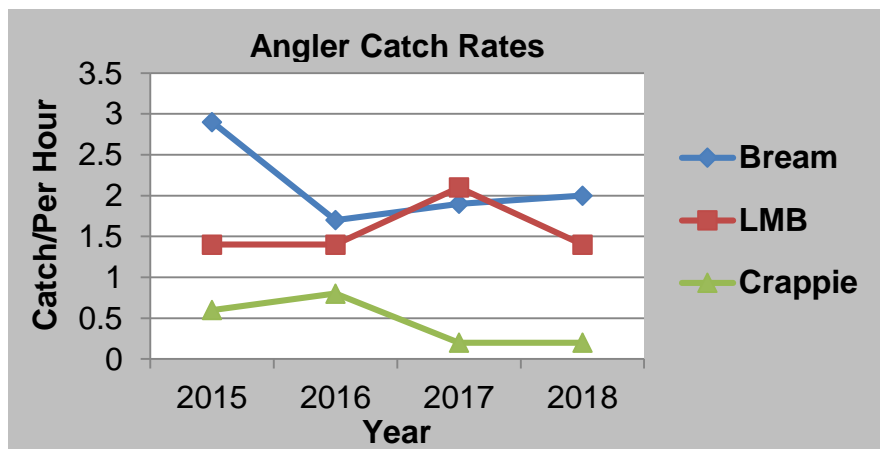
Below: 2018 electrofishing results from Prentiss Walker. Survey's are conducted every two years during the fall.

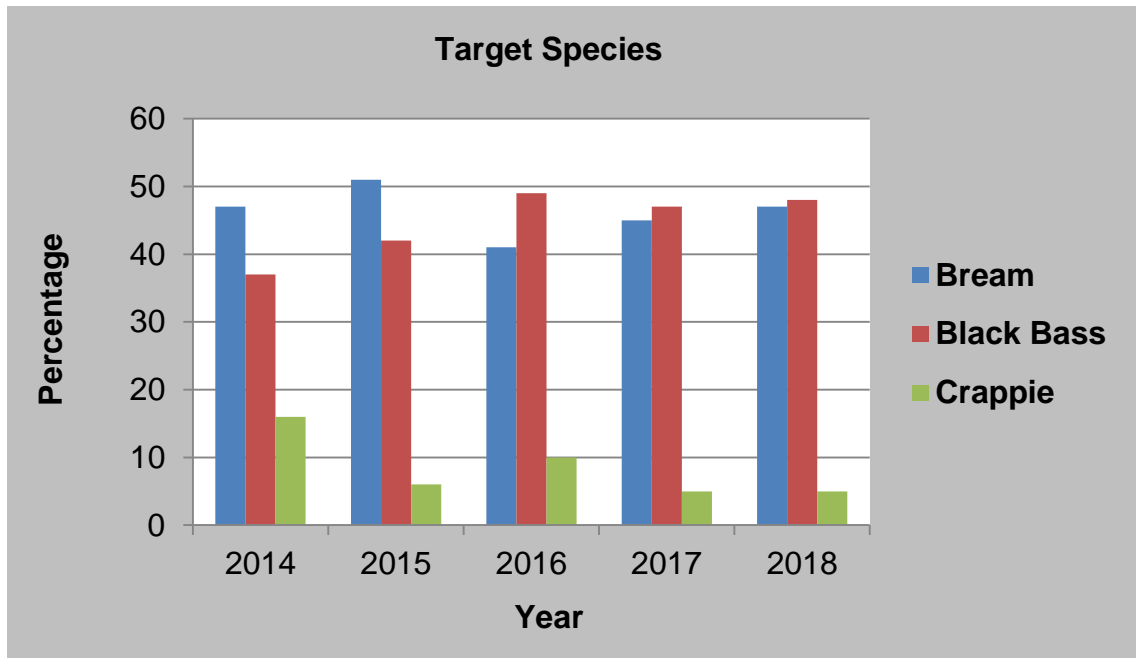


Left: Average weight of angler harvested fish. Largemouth Bass averaged 1.4 pounds and crappie averaged 1 pound in 2018. This lake is known for trophy bream, and the average weight was 0.7 pounds.

Right: Number of fish caught per hour of angler fishing effort. Largemouth Bass catch rates decreased in 2018 and bream catch rates slightly increased in 2018.



Below: Bream have been the most sought after species historically, but recently bass anglers have increased. Largemouth Bass and bream are plentiful at Lake Prentiss Walker.
