

Lake Mary Crawford 2025 REEL FACTS

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General Information: Lake Mary Crawford is a 128 acre State Fishing Lake which first opened in 1957. The lake was the first Dingell-Johnson construction project in Mississippi. The lake has long been known as a popular bream fishery.

Location: Approximately 5 miles west of Monticello off Hwy 84.

Fishery Management: Largemouth Bass, bream, crappie, and catfish.

Amenities

- 2 boat ramps with courtesy piers, parking lot, and public restroom with showers
- 2 handicapped fishing piers
- 20 camping pads with water/electric hookups and nature trail

Creel and Size Limits

• Bream: 100 per day

• Catfish: 10 per day

• Crappie: 15 per day

 Largemouth Bass: Slot limit, bass 16 - 22 inches in length must be released, 10 bass per day creel limit, only one may be over 22 inches in length

Regulations

- Fishing is not allowed from courtesy piers adjacent to boat ramp.
- Rod and reel or pole fishing is allowed. No trotlines, FFFD's, jugs, yoyo's, limblines, throwlines, or set hooks are allowed.
- Sport fishing licenses and fishing permits are required except on designated days during National Fishing and Boating Week.
- Skiing is allowed on Sunday, Memorial Day, July 4th, and Labor Day from noon to sunset within ski area.
- Lake is designated as No Wake all other times.

Fishing Tips

Bream

 Try crickets, red wigglers, and wax worms in shallow areas during late spring and summer. Brush piles around fishing piers are popular.

Catfish

 Try tightlining liver or blood scented bait along deep drop offs of main lake points and around the water control structure.

Crappie

 Target the water control structure and brush piles around the main lake.
 Minnows are the most popular choice.

Largemouth Bass

 Target stumps and brush piles in deeper water with junebug colored soft plastics. Topwater baits can also be good in the morning around grass. **Below:** Lake Mary Crawford is open for all record fish. Record fish must be weighed and verified by the lake manager, lake supervisor, or fisheries biologist. Anglers who catch a lake record fish will receive a certificate acknowledging their catch. There is no minimum weight for any open lake record.






Above: Locations of fish attractors placed in Lake Mary Crawford during renovations. Fish attractors are comprised of tree tops placed in a variety of depths. These tree tops can be excellent locations to catch Largemouth Bass, bream, and crappie throughout the year.


